

10 Characteristics of Children in the Montessori Classroom

- In order to become independent children must be free to make choices, make mistakes, learn from mistakes, and self-correct work. Teachers help guide students to become independent.

Creative/Inventive

- Maria Montessori believed that everything a child does is creative. Children should use this creativity to explore the world around them, problem solve, and study creative projects based on student interest and desire.

Self-Motivated

- Children often are more motivated when they have choice. This however, does not mean that they can do whatever they please. The Montessori environment is designed to help spark a love of learning in students.

Organized

- Montessori children begin to understand time-management at a younger age than most. Montessori classrooms and lessons stress the importance of remaining organized.

Global Thinker

- Montessori students study all aspects of the world in which we live. They receive a complete overview of the chronological development of our Earth, as well as the development of species.

Collaborator

- Montessori students work cooperatively and collaboratively on many tasks. This allows them to learn to work together, as well as learn from each other.

Leader

- Students help each other, work together, and develop strong leadership skills by working as a community in the classroom.
